His administration shipped backpacks to two elementary schools in Liberia; shipped medical supplies to JFK Medical Center in Monrovia; and has been part of a group that provided scholarships for Liberian students. Dr. Bokai has encouraged volunteerism, which took his daughter, Jartu, and some young nurses to work in Liberia.

<u>AMBASSADOR CHRISTOPHER T. MINIKON</u>: Ambassador Minikon has served for over 50 years as a public servant of the Liberian Government



and people in many capacities. He is one


